London, the 25th April, <u>1764</u>

We have, praise God, happily crossed the Maxglan⁴ brook but it did not go without – $s[alva] v[enia]^5 - [5]$ serving up some of the f--d again, but I was worst affected. But in this case we were able to save the money for taking medicines against vomiting, and we are, thanks be to God, all well. Anyone who has too much money need only undertake a journey from *Paris* to *London*, and he will certainly have his purse lightened. We had the honour of paying 4 louis d'or⁶ in Calais, [10] although we did not even dine at home, but with the Procurator to the King and the Admiralty, with whom we also left our coach. As soon as one reaches *Dover*, it gets even rawer, and, as one disembarks from the ship, one sees oneself surrounded by 30 to 40 men, all of whom are your obedient servants and wish to take the baggage from one's own servant by force in order to carry it to an inn, [15] and then one has to pay them whatever they demand. I had to pay 3 louis d'or for the crossing, for I had a ship of my own, for which one must pay 5 louis d'or. Accordingly, I took 4 other friends, who each paid me half a *louis d'or*, for there were 14 persons in the packet boat and, since there are only 10 to 12 beds in one ship, [20] it is very incommodious to remain among so many people who sometimes get astonishingly sea-sick. For being landed from the large ship via a smaller one in *Dover* one pays half a wreath-thaler⁸ per person. I therefore had to pay 6 small or 3 large wreath thalers, for I had 2 servants with me and consequently 7 post-horses as far as Calais, [25] with one of them riding. The second servant was an Italian by the name of Porta, who had already travelled this stretch 8 times, and all my friends in Paris advised me to take this man. It was in fact a very good move, for he brought order into everything and dealt with everything. [30] Now I seem to see nothing in London but masquera, 10 and how do you think my wife and my little girl look in the English hats, 11 and the great Wolfgang in English clothes? My next letter will tell you more. We commend ourselves.
