Vienna, 6th Aug., <u>1768</u>

I would never have imagined that I would still be Vienna on the feast-day of Saint Lawrence.³ I did not have the least doubt that I would have the pleasure of being able to congratulate you in person on your name-day. [5] But you are a witness yourself of how often homo proponit, Deus disponit⁴ has proved true in my case. My last letter⁵ gave you a detailed explanation of why, and with what vexation, I have to continue to stay on here. And I would be tired of such events if I had not known from experience that many a matter often took a completely different turn than I could ever have hoped. [10] And how sometimes divine Providence had apparently used force to drive me forwards or hold me back! Enough! Our wish from the most sincere hearts |: which you know : | is for constant good health for you and all who belong to you. May the Most High keep you and your whole household from all misfortune and allow, [15] today or tomorrow, as God wills, us to see each other together again in a blessed eternity, even if it were only in a heavenly gatekeeper's lodge; we would certainly not cause any expense to succeeding generations of Christians by our canonisation. I have noted with the greatest pleasure⁶ that the eminent Prince, His Grace of Eichstätt,⁷ has left fine presents behind him in Salzburg. [20] A sign that his stay there was a pleasure. I wish for more of these events. I cannot report anything from here, except that, several days ago, almost all of Eysenstatt⁸ was reduced to ashes by an accident. It will no doubt be reported at length in the newspapers. In Poland the developments are very heated: 9 as long as it does not bring further consequences in its wake. [25] There are reasons to fear that. But at the same time everyone is in splendid fettle. Keep well, sir, we all commend ourselves. From Herr Peysser¹⁰ I again received 20 # 11 today. We are, praise God, well. By the way, do you know that inoculation against smallpox is having great success? At Medling, 12 near Schönbrunn, the Empress has placed a house for children at the disposal of the English *inoculator*. [30]

It applies to poor children, of whom each, or rather their parents, receives a ducat on entry. --

Over 40 have already been inoculated. The Emperor and the Empress¹³ come to the house almost daily, and are entirely occupied with it. [35] Almost all the esteemed *medici* here, on the other hand, are almost furious over it. Is that any surprise? It was simply a certain illness and a certain cure, which, whether it worked or not, usually earned a lot. Praise God! Our *inoculator* was the best.¹⁴
