0283. LEOPOLD MOZART TO HIS WIFE, SALZBURG

À Madame / Madame Marie Anne / Mozart / à / Salzbourg / par <u>Mantova</u> / <u>Insprugg¹</u>

Milan, 6th February, <u>1773</u>.

I quite firmly hoped to leave here in the first days of the coming week and consequently to [5] see you both before the last days of Carnival, but the damned *rheumatism* has now appeared in my right shoulder,² and I can do nothing myself, so everything is ruled out for me, and you can imagine how I feel; all the more so, as we now have terribly cold weather [10] and a wind that goes through bone and marrow. No warm room, not even a fireplace in our room. I have to try to warm myself only using the bed covered with fur and clothes, with the foot muffs also being used. In the midst of all this, if possible, I will strive to get away from here at the end of the coming week and will make efforts to be in Salzburg for the last 3 days of Carnival. [15] I repeat: if possible. For, if my *rheumatism* is not fully gone, I cannot risk undertaking, in this cold, such a long and, in the Tyrol, certainly cold journey, and to expose myself to the danger of perhaps getting stuck in a miserable inn on the way. In the meantime, I suspect that this will be my last letter from Milan. [20] If, contrary to expectations, I am here for more than a week longer, I will give you more details. If you receive no letter, this is a sign that we have departed, for one does not always find an opportunity to write during a journey, all the more so as I am travelling via Brescia, while the post from Milan goes to Germany via Mantua. [25] As far as our Miss Mitzerl of the Dancing Master's House³ is concerned, you can ask her, with my compliments, to be patient until I come myself, since this short time will make no difference now. Then we should certainly come to an agreement,⁴ if nothing else at all is possible. She will no doubt be able to wait this short time.

During the performance of the 2^{nd} opera,⁵ which is beautiful and is being presented at great cost, [30] there was an accident in which the 2^{nd} principal dancer, *Salomoni*,⁶ pulled his *corda magna* and wrenched it so badly that he will not be able to dance again for the rest of this Carnival, which is causing great upset in the *ballet <u>Giasone e Medea</u>*. More about that in person.

I would be very grateful if either of you could seek an opportunity to speak to His *Excellency* the Royal High Steward,⁷ [35] then with His *Excellency* Count *Sauerau*,⁸ or with Her

Excellency Countess von *Arco*,⁹ and to give, with my most humble compliments, news of my indisposition, all the more so as there have been enquiries regarding our arrival, while I will certainly depart as soon as possible.

Our compliments to all friends within and outside the house. [40] Wolfgang is writing a *quartet*,¹⁰ and I am glad that I have written this. We kiss both of you many 100 000 000 times and I am your old mutilated Mzt mp¹¹

You will no doubt have heard that young *Alberti*¹² or, rather, his wife, has inherited 200 000 florins. Her brother died and left 600 000 florins. *Baron Piccini*¹³ has also inherited some 30 000 florins.

Mozart made contact with him in 1781, shortly after arriving in Vienna. Leutgeb lived in a large house outside town; Mozart stayed there occasionally when his wife was taking spa treatment in Baden in 1791. Some time previously, he had announced intentions of coming to Italy, cf. No. 0266/31-32.
