I am indeed wholeheartedly glad that you had such a good time, but you must believe that I have not had a good time, but, yes, I could not count how often, I believe that we were certainly at the *opera* 6 or 7 times and were then at the *festa di balo*, ³ [5] which begins, as in Vienna, after the *opera*, but with the difference that there is more order in the dancing in Vienna. We also saw the facchinad⁴ and the chicherad, 5 that is, a masquerade, which is fine to see because people dress as porters or as house servants, and there was a boat with many people in it, [10] and many also went on foot, 4 or 6 bands of trumpets and timpani, and also a number of bands of violins, and other instruments. The Chiccherata, this is a masquerade which we also saw today, that is: *Chiccheri* is the Milanese name for the same as what we call petits maitres, or conceited personages, who then all went on horseback, but which was attractive to watch. [15] I am just as glad that Herr von Amann⁷ is better now as I was troubled when I heard that he had had an accident. What kind of mask, then, did Madame Rosa⁸ have, what kind did Herr von Mölk⁹ have, what kind did the Prince¹⁰ and Herr von Schiedenhofen¹¹ have? I ask you to write telling me if you know, you will be doing me a very great favour. [20] Today we are guests of Count Firmian's 12 esteemed steward 13 to mark the last day. 14 There we will have something to gabble about. Addio, farewell. Next post-day I will write you a Milanesish letter. I am etc.
