## 0182. LEOPOLD MOZART TO HIS WIFE, SALZBURG; POSTSCRIPTS BY WOLFGANG, JOSEPH MEISSNER AND LEOPOLD

Rome, 2<sup>nd</sup> *May*, 1770

Your *catarrh* will hopefully have gone a long time ago. The latest news is that Herr Meissner¹ arrived from Naples at midday today and is off again to Florence in 2 days and from there to Salzburg as the crow flies, thus reaching there very soon. [5] He asks to be commended to everyone. His High Princely Grace² has already written.³ You want to know⁴ whether Wolfgang is still singing and fiddling etc. etc. He fiddles, but not in public – He sings, but only whenever one puts some words in front of him – He has grown a little, – I am neither fatter nor thinner – and we have also become accustomed to the Italian food. [10] We are leaving earlier than I thought because I have the opportunity of going to Naples with 4 *Augustinians*,⁵ namely on the 8<sup>th</sup> May. Otherwise I have nothing to write to you about. I hope God will keep you and Nannerl in good health and will bring us safely not only to Naples and back, but also home again as well in due time. I will not stay in Naples much longer than 5 weeks, [15] and then go via *Loretto*<sup>6</sup> to *Bologna* and *Pisa* and those areas and wait in whichever place is coolest and healthiest for the great heat to pass.

Herr Meissner says to me that he has not seen a letter from Salzburg since the beginning of February. Now I also know the reason why *Mademoiselle Rosa*<sup>7</sup> has no mother. [20] My compliments to all friends, both ladies and gentlemen. We kiss you and Nannerl 10000 times and I am as always your

Mzt.
