We are very happy that you had a good time in Triebenbach¹ and have reached home again safely.² I am tied to the house for a couple of days [5] because I have developed severe *rheumatism* throughout my whole body, although I have almost steamed it away by drinking pure elderflower tea.³ Among the medicines there was only a single paper of black powder.⁴ Fortunately, *Frau* von *Asti*⁵ has a great quantity, and since there is only a single digestive powder left, it is fortunate that this same lady has the formula and handed it in at the apothecary's in the presence of Wolfgang, [10] whom I had sent to her, to have a little of it made for me. But it is not necessary to say this to both of you, who, when you read this, I hope are not only completely healthy, but almost ready to travel.⁶ So, after receiving this, you might write to the *Ill^{me} Sgr: Luggiati*⁷ in *Verona*. I have already said to you that the *Serenata*⁸ has carried off the prize. Keep well, both of you. [15] We kiss you many 1000000000 times and I am as always your

MOZART'S POSTSCRIPT TO HIS SISTER:

Papa said that Herr Kerschbaumer¹³ certainly made his journey with profit and all circumspection, [20] and we can assure you that he conducted himself most sensibly. He can certainly give a better account of his journey than others among his friends, one of whom could not see Paris properly because the houses there are too high. Today Hasse's opera¹⁴ is on, but, because Papa is not going out, I cannot go. [25] Luckily, I know absolutely all the arias by heart, and so I can hear and see them at home in my thoughts.
