Milan, 24<sup>th</sup> or 23<sup>rd</sup> November, 1771

We are still here, and will probably stay here another week, since the Archduke¹ will not come back from *Varese*² until Tuesday and will then speak to us. Nevertheless, we will arrive in Salzburg [5] during the first fortnight of *December*, God willing, since even if we stay somewhere on the way, we reach Salzburg from here in a week. We are well, praise God. Address your future correspondence only to *Verona*, and I believe it will be the last, unless you receive another letter from me in the meantime. [10] We have constantly cold but very beautiful weather here, and it has not rained for a long time. Herr *Marcobruni*,³ in whose room I am writing this, commends himself to both of you, as do the two Herr von Trogers⁴ and *Msr*. and *Madame d'Aste*.⁵ Today Herr *Misliwitschek*,⁶ who arrived yesterday, called on us and is writing the first *opera*. Herr von Mayr¹ and Herr de *Chiusolis*³ also commend themselves. We often meet together, [15] and yesterday we made music redoubtably at Herr von Mayer's. We commend ourselves to all good friends, both gentlemen and ladies. We kiss you both 100 000 times, and I am as always your

## MOZART'S POSTSCRIPT TO HIS SISTER:

## Dearest sister!

Herr von Älfen<sup>9</sup> is in Milan, and is still the same as he was in Vienna and *Paris*. I know one more piece of news: Herr *Manzoli*,<sup>10</sup> [20] who was otherwise considered and held by everyone to be the most prudent of the *castrati*, has shown a sample of his lack of reason and his arrogance in his old age. He was engaged for the *opera* for 500 *cigliati*<sup>11</sup> and, because there was no mention of the *serenata* in the contract, he wanted to have 500 *cigliati* more for

[25] The court gave him only 700 and a beautiful golden box |: I think it would have been enough :| but, as a *castrato*, he gave back the 700 *cigl*. along with the golden box, and departed with nothing. I do not know what kind of outcome this story will have. An unfortunate one, I expect. Otherwise I know of nothing. My handkiss to Mama. Compliments to all good friends, both gentlemen and ladies. *Addio*. [30] Keep well. I am your true, faithful brother Wolfgang
