[Salzburg, 9th December, 1780]

Here is the suit, such as it is. I had to have it patched quickly, for the whole *taffeta* lining in the *camisole* was torn to shreds. I am writing this on Saturday the 9th at half past 9 in the evening, [5] for today Herr Esser gave his *concert* in the theatre. No less than 40 florins were left over for him, he is travelling with this *diligence* and will call on you without delay. He is a spirited, old, clownish fellow. But he plays when he plays seriously: with the most secure and astonishing execution, and yet also has a beautiful *adagio*, which few strong *allegro* players have. Now, when he gets into having fun, however, [10] he plays only on the G-string with the greatest dexterity. With a little piece of pencil wood he played pieces beating on the strings with astonishing speed and accuracy. His playing on the *viola d'amour* is charming. And what touched me and astounded me, although apparently a piece of childishness, was his whistling with his mouth, where he whistled a *recitative* and *aria* to defy any singer [15] with all the expression, slides, *détaché*, trills etc., in short astonishingly, and accompanied himself *pizzicato* on the *violin*.

He called on us daily, <<u>mad as a goose like Johann Hus</u>>, but has at the same time a skilful genius that earns much money – and <<u>yet never has money</u>>. *Addio*, we both kiss you, on Monday I will write to you again, take care of yourself! [20] I am your faithful father
