0564. MARIA ANNA (NANNERL)¹ MOZART TO HER BROTHER, MUNICH; POSTSCRIPT BY LEOPOLD

Dearest brother!

[Salzburg, 18th December, 1780]

I am heartily glad that you are in fine fettle once again and – this much I gathered from your letter – are in a good frame of mind. Here follows the end of the theatre performances before the Advent period: I have already written to you of the 46th performance [5] <u>The Sleepless Nights.</u>²

The 3rd *December* was thus the 47th performance, <u>The Spleen</u>; a new ballet, <u>The Thrashed Lover</u>; a good ballet.

The 4th: the 48th performance, The <u>Prisoners Of War</u>⁵ in 5 acts.

The 5th: the 49th performance, an original comedy in one act, [10] <u>In Danger One Learns Who One's Friends Are.</u>⁶ A passable little piece. A comedy, again in one act, <u>The Sale of Commissions.</u>⁷ A thoroughly good piece. The ballet <u>Jealousy in the Seraglio.</u>⁸

The 6th: the 50th performance, a tragedy in 5 acts, <u>Eduard Montrose</u>.

The 8th: I was at court to hear <u>M^{sr}: Esser</u> play:⁹ he plays with exceptional ease, [15] you will of course hear him yourself.

The 9th: he gave an concert in the theatre, with \underline{Md} : $\underline{Md$

The 10th: the 51st performance, <u>The Tailor and His Son</u>; ¹² a new ballet in 3 acts of Herr Schikaneder's ¹³ invention, <u>The Pleasant Dream</u>, ¹⁴ or, [20] <u>The Prince's Zest for Hunting</u>, the music for it written by <u>Herr Michel</u>. A thoroughly entertaining and good ballet. And the music is thoroughly easy to listen to, and is appropriate to the story of the ballet.

The 11th: the 52nd performance, <u>The Latest School for Wives</u>, ¹⁵ we saw it done by Böhm.

[25] The 13th: the 53rd performance, a play in 5 acts, <u>Ambition and Garrulousness</u>. ¹⁶ Herr Schikaneder dedicated it to the Archbishop in gratitude for permission to play here throughout the winter.

The 14th: the 54th performance, a comedy in 2 acts, <u>The Unequal Friends</u>, ¹⁷ the ballet <u>The</u> Pleasant Dream. Now the theatre remains closed until St. Stephen's Day. [30]

Last Thursday, the 14th *December*, mourning dress was donned for the Empress, and also lasts 3 months, as in Munich.

If the Archbishop is still going to Vienna, as I have heard once again, perhaps a great number of Salzburgians will come to Munich to hear your opera: [35] *Msr*: *Fiala*, the young Weinroter are firmly resolved to do so.

The 17th: the esteemed Paymaster¹⁸ donated the first prize. *Mad. Maresquelle*¹⁹ and *Msr. Wirtenstädter*,²⁰ who is here again, had to share the first and 2nd prizes. She shot 4, 3, and a circle. *Msr. Schicaneder* has bought himself a new gun, and *Msr. Feigele* always has Ensign Antretter's gun fetched for him, [40] so we have 7 bolt guns. No one shoots with yours except *Mad. Maresquelle*.

Msr: Sieger²¹ is still here, but he very seldom gives us the chance to see him because he is too taken up with studies with Msr: Döll,²² was at the theatre only one single time and at the concert with Msr. Esser. I know of nothing more that is new, [45] except that on Sunday the 17th, in the evening, the wife of Count Ernst Lodron²³ was buried, that by order of the Archbishop 6 valets and 6 gatekeepers were to accompany the coffin. The first requiem is on the 18th, on the 19th the requiem for the Empress;²⁴ on the 20th the 2nd and on the 22nd the 3rd for the Countess. The Court Music will no doubt do the third one. The Chief Gentlemen in Mourning are [50] Count Momolo,²⁵ Niclas Lodron,²⁶ and Carl Arco; ²⁷ the Chief Ladies in Mourning are the 2 elder Fraüleins²⁸ and Mimi Lodron.²⁹

Aproposito,³⁰ are you having such abominable weather in Munich as we are here? It is dirty, and more snow is constantly coming, so that one often does not know how one should go. Today it froze completely for the first time.

[55] I am to write something to you for Tresel,³¹ and that is that she no longer wanted to stay with us because you are not here, so you know that when you write, write something about her, for she complains that you think about her so little. You know of course how whimsical she is. I have a thousand compliments to send to you, especially from Threserl *Barisany*,³² *Maresquelle*, [60] Catherl and Seperl Gilovsky,³³ the Mayer household,³⁴

Catherl Gilovsky would certainly like to travel with us if only she had board and lodgings, but it would be too expensive for us if we had to keep her as well.

LEOPOLD MOZART'S POSTSCRIPT:

[70] I have this very moment received your letter of the 16th safely. Here Herr Esser went on foot, wore his black woollen suit with spur attached to it,³⁸ and it seems to me that that is his entire wardrobe, although, as I know for certain, he earned a great deal of money in Vienna. – He may have taken 70 florins away with him from here after expenses. He is quite certainly a good, entertaining clown, [75] but also quite senseless in his housekeeping; furthermore someone who obfuscates his true merits by *charlatanry*, and yet obtains admiration and money from the unknowledgeable by these means. The goitre pillules will come by post-coach. Your sister thanks you for the fine recommendation for her 3 goitres. [80] Yet with a small one she can present herself as a good Salzburg lady, for this is the true national beauty. Regarding the matter of the six weeks, I will reply with the next post; I have too little time now. Keep well and we both kiss you from the heart and I am as ever your faithful father,

[85] With the next post-coach the whole opera copied out for printing, with Italian and German side by side, will follow. – I pay out so much money for His Excellency Count Se[e]au³⁹ with letters and post-coaches that I do not know myself exactly how much it may amount to. He will hopefully refund me. I have already said in my previous letters, and say it yet again, [90] that I have no doubts at all about the quality and excellence of your composition, especially when you have a good orchestra, and that you have; questo basta!⁴⁰ I hope that the 2nd rehearsal turned out as well as the first one, and then the third act – Finis coronat opus.⁴¹ Oops, Finis Corona Topus.⁴² Keep well!
