Dearest Herr Winter.

Salzb., 3rd April, 1784

I write in haste and send the 4 *concertos*² which, as I have written, are the last for 4 ducats.³ – I still have the 6 <u>clavier sonatas</u>⁴ for <u>clavier solo</u>, which are not known, but were written only for us.⁵ [5] Should these, too, be of service to His Illustrious Highness,⁶ to whom we most submissively commend ourselves, you can arrange for a written communication to be sent to me. Farewell, I must close, since 4 persons from Munich are with me to fetch the young 15-year-old *Marchand*,⁷ who has had lessons from me for 3 years and is now returning as an <u>outstanding player of violin</u> and <u>clavier</u> and has also come a long way in <u>composition</u>. [10] Besides that he has missed nothing in Latin, although he has learned his main subsidiary subject, Italian and French, not without substantial results. <u>addio!</u> I am and remain as always your sincere, most obedient friend,
