1015. LEOPOLD MOZART TO HIS DAUGHTER,¹ ST. GILGEN

Little Leopoldl² is well!

Salzb., 29th Xbr.,³ 1786.

He, and <u>all of us</u>, wish <u>all of you</u> a happy and blessed New Year! and with that <u>Amen</u>!

[5] On holy Christmas Day, between 5 and 6 o'clock in the evening, Herr *Brunetti*⁴ passed into eternity. The church service is in St. Peter's at 9 o'clock today. Heinrich,⁵ who has never seen anyone die in his life, was just on his way there at 4 o'clock after vespers and heard that a *doctor* and clergyman had been sent for, stayed there because *Dr. Barisani*⁶ said <u>he will not hold on much longer</u>, and then watched <u>all</u>, <u>all of it</u> with inquisitive attentiveness in the manner you are familiar with. His inquisitiveness was soon transformed into fearful reflection and mature pondering, and he came back home completely speechless and petrified, since this event had a greater effect than 10 sermons. This was a very sound lesson for him indeed! [15] and he said: <u>My God! So it had to be *Brunetti* who was the first person I saw die</u>. He looked better after his death than when alive, only thinner. He now no longer had the strength to bring up the matter from the festering pustules, which had issued from him in great quantities during this time, since the lungs were probably almost completely suppurated already, – so this was how he ended.

[20] Since I have been sending Heinrich to the Capellhaus⁷ in my place since that time, he was invited to eat again yesterday; – so I went along for his sake so that he did not stay too long into the evening or even start drinking. – You know that otherwise I am already back home at 11 o'clock, – but since they were performing a *cantata* |: <u>the Schoolmaster</u>⁸ :|, [25] I did not want rob him of his fun. We went there at 6 o'clock, – and when we came back home after 12 o'clock we heard that in the meantime the glass-carrier woman had called and wanted to leave already in the morning again. That, of course, was very inconvenient! So I had to get out of bed again in the morning.

I received no more than 2 *plays* from the Eberlins' Waberl,¹⁰ which I am sending you herewith. – I received the money. Nandl¹¹ and Tresel¹² send hand-kisses and thank you most obediently, – if there had been time, Nandl would have written. [35] I will obtain the money for Deissendorf¹³ and the fish for Munich myself.

It will hardly be conceivable for the trip to Munich to take place.¹⁴ Yes, in the present circumstances it is out of the question, since the Archbishop could not give any concerts at all without Heinrich. – Who is to *lead the orchestra*? – Pinzger¹⁵ or Stadler?¹⁶ [40] – –

The new *bass*¹⁷ is a man, and very good for the church, since he sings clearly, brightly and accurately.

I have not seen the umbrella, -I do not know whether the glass-carrier woman brought it, - nor does Tresel know anything about it, -I will hear about it when the woman comes. [45]

I have already been taking the sago for some days, and now I am eating fasting dishes for the first time again. I feel not at all bad, only my left arm and my left hand are always colder than the right. I hope it will improve little by little.

[50] Heinrich commends himself, I kiss both of you from the heart, repeat my sincere good wishes, greet the children and am as always your sincere father
